From the Pastor...

This month brings two events that are important to the parish for different reasons. The first is our annual bazaar, which will be held on the weekend of November 7th. It is amazing the see the hard work of all those on the various committees who gather in the hall each night prior to the first day of this annual event. It is equally amazing to witness the crowds of people from near and far who have made this bazaar part of their yearly activities. If you look at the church's budget it is clear to see why the bazaar is so vital. However, the bazaar is vital for another reason too. It provides the parish with a common goal. It allows parishioners to meet each other and to feel united. The bazaar shows us in a very



real way what this parish can accomplish when it sets its mind on something. The bazaar, to be sure, is vital to the "fellowship" aspect of the parish, but the "spiritual" aspect of the parish is just as important.

In addition to the bazaar, November also marks the start of our preparation for our Lord's birth. If you have looked at your mail recently, you can already see "holiday" catalogues being sent. I know that what I am about to say has been said before and will be said again, but I really feel that we must stop this trend. Christmas is not a holiday. Christmas is the birthday of our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ. If Christ were not born, what would our chances be for salvation? When Advent or "the fast of St. Philip" starts on November

15th what will our response be? This is the key word – response.

In theology classes in seminary, we learned a very fancy word. In the fact the word is even in Greek! See how important the word must be! The word is

synergia (synergy). As Bishop Kallistos Ware says in his classic book *The Orthodox Church*, "To describe the relation between the grace of God and free will of man, Orthodoxy uses the term cooperation or synergy; in (St.) Paul's words: 'We are felloworkers with God' (I Cor. 3:9). If man is to achieve full fellowship with God, he cannot do so without God's help, yet he must also play his own part: man as well as God must make his contribution to the common work, although what God does is of immeasurably greater importance than which man does." (p. 226) To repeat: If man is to achieve full fellowship with God, he cannot do so without God's help, yet he must also play his own part.

For some reason, people think that the only fasting period the Church has is Great Lent. How sad! Advent, like other fasting periods, allows us the chance to return to God - to refocus our minds, bodies, and souls toward that which is needful. Advent requires our full attention. God gives us so much can't we give him a little of ourselves? Can't we deny ourselves just a little? Just a little? To be sure that church is fellowship. I can't think of anyone who enjoys Arabic music, as much as I do, yet is it the sole purpose of the Church? I can't think of anyone else who enjoys the cooking of the Middle East as much as I do, but is this the sole purpose of the Church? But the essence of the Church is being a member of the Body of Christ is full union with each other and in full communion with God through the life giving mystery of the Eucharist.

Make this Advent different. Make this Advent a time of reflection. Reflecting on God's great love for us. Make this time a period of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving (giving to the poor). Instead of going to parties before Christmas, encourage your friends and family to celebrate AFTER the Feast. Would any one of us even consider celebrating before Easter? Would anyone of us even consider chanting "Christ is risen..." on Good Friday? Then why would we "party" before Christmas?!

It is my fervent hope that all of us view Advent in a new way, a fresh way. It is my hope that our common journey towards Bethlehem allows us to find, once again, the right way. It is my hope that we can gather in this holy Church of St. John of Damascus on Wednesday, December 24th at 6 p.m. to pray together, to be together, to share in the Eucharist together, to celebrate together, and to shout from the depths of our hearts that "Christ is Born!! Glorify Him!!"



THE ORDER OF ST. IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH: WHERE WE ARE — WHERE WE NEED TO BE

Jesus commanded us that "what you do unto the least of your brethren you do unto me". Further, when He appeared to His disciples following His Resurrection, He exulted those "who believe yet who have not seen and not touched". These two messages give meaning to the good works of The Order, which might be characterized in 2003 as follows:



Blessed are you the members of The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch who in secret do unto the least of your brethren whom you cannot see, cannot touch, and most likely do not know, yet believe God will combine our individual gifts for the benefit of those who need it most.

We soon will approach 3,000 members who come from all parts of North America and all walks of life. It is truly a testament to this God inspired vision. Our members enjoy an irreplaceable feeling of "touching peoples' lives". We do it anonymously, without concern for personal recognition, and we do it because of our belief in Jesus Christ, our Orthodox Faith, and our Antiochian Archdiocese. We are particularly grateful to the faithful of our Archdiocese who recognize The Order's "good works". However, our work will not be complete until every faithful soul has joined this movement.

RESPONSES TO THOSE SEEKING ANSWERS ABOUT THE ORDER:

1. They say: "The Order is 'too showy.'" We reply:

- a. We are witnesses to our faith and examples to others
- b. We wear secular insignia without feeling "showy"
- 2. They say: "The Order is just about money." We reply:
 - a. The Order is first a spiritual movement manifested through financial giving
 - b. Jesus sanctioned financial giving when he honored the poor widow who gave her last two coins. She gave from her need. The Order only asks that we give from our surplus
 - c. When we give to The Order we participate in the "Miracle of Giving": it is only through God that our combined gifts add up to a greater sum than each person individually.
- 3. They say: <u>"I give to many worthy organizations and want to spread my giving.</u>" We reply:
 - a. Do the secular charities open and close with prayer?
 - b. Do they ask God for guidance?
 - c. Will other charities remember and help the Orthodox if we don't? Thus, if we don't put our faith as our top priority, who will?
- 4. They say: "I want to give anonymously." We reply:
 - a. Giving anonymously is acceptable.
 - b. Standing before God and pledging our commitment to Him is an honor.
- 5. They say: "I can't afford it; it is only for the rich." We reply:
 - a. We can't afford not to
 - b. \$1.35 / day = 1 cup of coffee
 - c. Members currently are from all walks of life.
- 6. They say, "<u>I'm too young or too old</u>." We reply:
 - a. Everyone of age can join

- b. Young people are clamoring to be members when they understand they can join. They want to give back for the next generation what they were able to enjoy and take advantage.
- c. A "young" woman of 80 years joined two years ago and recruited 7 new members this spring at her Parish Life Conference.
- 7. They say, "<u>I support my church. I don't have any connection with the Archdiocese.</u>" We reply:
 - a. Every Parish and every Antiochian Orthodox is impacted. 33% of the Archdiocese budget is from The Order for our Christian books, music, evangelism, and ministry.
 - b. The Order contributes 100% of the funds annually to the Priest's retirement / housing allowance. Every priest in our Archdiocese benefits.
 - c. Young people enjoy a camping experience and annual College Conference both of which are sponsored by The Order.

America needs Orthodoxy now more than ever before, especially since September 11, 2001. Americans seek security for themselves and their families. The Orthodox Faith is the candle that Christ lit 2,000 years ago. It is a beacon of stability, steadfastness, and strength. The winds of adversity blow strong but we must not let this light extinguish. I ask that you pray and make the commitment to serve our church, our country, and our Faith.

A challenge to the current members of The Order: Take a chance if you haven't already and approach someone about The Order. Feel something good happen inside you. Christ approached 12 ordinary people and asked them to "follow me". They trusted him and did <u>extraordinary</u> things. He called on them individually by name and not in large groups. We therefore must reach out to every individual as Christ did. We too can do extraordinary things if we trust in the Lord.

Giving to someone we know is our responsibility.
Giving to someone we don't know is our choice.
Make The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch your choice.

The only way to God is through helping other people and denying "I."
