Stewardship? Stewardship!

After a great deal of research and preparation, The Church of St. John of Damascus will implement a Stewardship program for 2007. 1995, John Haddad and Ray Hamwey, along with Fr. John, spent many hours and hard work putting together stewardship program to help support the needs our church. that time, the Executive Board decided that the parish wasn't ready for a change and didn't implement the program. With the positive results from our recent parish sample survey the Executive Board has now decided that the time has come to make this change.

Like those of our sister parishes, a Stewardship successful program promises to be a positive change that will ensure that the life of this parish succeeds both spiritually and socially. We feel this program will secure our beautiful church and keep this standing structure for many generations to come.

The current dues and pledge system of our parish asks for a minimum assessment of \$421 per baptized soul over the age of 18. Of the 670 eligible dues payers, only 17% pay the actual assessment, and another 10% pay more. Of the remaining number, 35% pay less than the assessment, i.e. \$421 and the largest number, 37%, pay nothing at all.

We have both a need and an opportunity to improve upon our current pledge system. present time, revenue from pledges and envelopes covers less than half of the parish budget. The rest comes from special donations for memorials, sacraments, etc., and this figure varies from year to year and is unpredictable. With full participation, pledges can provide us with reliable income to cover our costs. The Executive Board has set a goal for 2007 of covering at least 51% of our budget with stewardship pledges. Our present system is "one size fits all." Stewardship, on the other hand, stresses a more equitable approach to giving. We are called to

give of our time, talents, and treasures. Each of us is asked to return to God a fair portion of that with which he has blessed us.

This month, you will receive a brochure that explains the principles of tithing. We hope this brochure is helpful in providing more information about stewardship and tithing. Many of our sister parishes are experiencing success with proportionate giving programs.

We ask that you support this program and embrace a successful change.

Let's not let the sacrifices of those before us, who have worked so hard to build our beautiful church, be diminished. The investment we make be there for will generations to come. Please help us; with full participation from everyone, St. John's will have a successful stewardship program that will keep our church alive and thriving for generations to come. * ADVENT Please remember that the Christmas Fast begins on Wednesday, November 15th. Like other Lenten periods, the Church calls us to increase (or even start) our efforts in prayer, fasting, and giving to the poor. It is also the perfect time to have your Confession heard. Confessions are heard on Sunday morning from 8:40 a.m. to 9:40 a.m. or by appointment. Please note, as in past years, confessions will *not* be heard on Christmas Eve. Let's all do something to prepare us for our Lord's birth! (Liturgy for Christmas will be on Sunday, December 24th @ 6 pm. *NO* services will be held on Monday, December 25th).

* PLEASE REMEMBER It is the teaching of the Holy Orthodox Church that only those Orthodox Christians who have prepared themselves through prayer, recent confession, and fasting (and being on time for church) should approach the chalice. It is likewise the teaching of the Church that our non-Orthodox guests and friends should not approach the chalice or that Orthodox Christians cannot and should not take communion in non-Orthodox Churches.

❖ CREMATION The following policy statement


concerning cremation is excerpted from the minutes a recent meeting of our Archdiocesan Synod of Bishops: "His Eminence emphasized that the Orthodox Church is **against** cremation. The policy of this Archdiocese is that no funeral will be

offered in any location for the body that will be cremated. However, the priest may say the Trisagion for the departed over the body in the funeral home before cremation and in the church for the forty-day memorial. Under no circumstances will any prayer be offered over the ashes. This was approved unanimously."

From the Order of St. I gnatius...

I have just returned from the Governing Council meeting of The Order of St. Ignatius in Troy, Michigan. The Council approved funding for the following projects: \$10,000 for Treehouse Ministries and \$5,000 for Martha and Mary House, both programs for unwed mothers; \$3,000 for the Chinese translation Project; \$15,000 for The Orthodox Christian Fellowship; \$15,000 to the Married Seminarians' Fund; \$10,000 to the Antiochian Village Camp, and \$15,000 to the Department of Youth for its leadership training program. The Order also made a contribution to the gift purse presented to Metropolitan Philip on the occasion of his 40th year in the episcopacy; Saidna Philip in turn donated the purse to the Clergy Retirement Fund.

The St. John of Damascus Chapter of The Order met for its first annual Fall Social on Sunday, October 15th. Luncheon was served and the discussion centered on our recruitment efforts for the St. John of Damascus Centennial. We hope to induct a record number of members in October 2007 during our gala weekend with Metropolitan Philip. Individual membership is granted with an annual gift of \$500. Dues can be paid through the electronic funds transfer system -- \$42 a month deducted from your checking account.

The following homily on stewardship was given by Deacon John Zarras at St. John of Damascus Church on Sunday, September 24, 2006. Deacon John is a communicant at Christ the Savior Church in Southbury, Ct. and is the father of St. John parishioner Elizabeth MacNeil.

Good afternoon. I am happy to be here. Fr. John Teebagy and my daughter, Elizabeth, asked that I come and share my experiences and thoughts on Stewardship and what it means to be a steward. You are taking a new and bold step in the life of the parish. Change sometimes is uncomfortable and doubt enters into our minds.

Today's Gospel lesson applies to this test of faith (Luke 5:1-11.) In the morning, Jesus asks Peter and the others to put out their boats and fish. Peter has doubts - they had fished all night and caught nothing, he reasons. But, Peter does as Jesus commands and not only do they catch fish, but they catch fish abundantly (the nets are full.) Peter admits being sinful for doubting Jesus, and then Peter, James and John give up everything they had and follow Jesus. The message of this Gospel is: Faith placed Jesus is rewarded in abundantly!

Stewardship is looking at ourselves as good stewards accordance with the teachings of our Lord. All we have is from God. God is the provider of everything - it is not us but God who directs and permits all. In the Divine Liturgy, we say "Thine own of thine own..." God gives us the grapes from which we make our offering of wine, and gives us the grain from which we make our offering of bread. We give Him back what He gave us. In thankfulness, we are asked to offer a percentage of our first gifts, not our crumbs, back to

Him. Our hearts and personal relationship with God determines how much we should return. No one else can set an amount for each of us. It is deeply personal and depends on how abundantly we feel blessed.

You can look to those in the pews on your left, right, in front, or in back and wonder what they think and what they will do, but it does not matter; what matters is what you alone personally want and will do. Setting a fixed amount for everyone is wrong in that it assumes all people face the same needs and have been given the same financial, material and spiritual gifts, which is not true.

About 20 years ago, parishes in the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese began the transition to a spiritual adoption principles of the stewardship to fund the ministries of the parish. As parishes transitioned to stewardship, like the Gospel lesson of today, they found their nets became full. My small OCA parish was founded 14 years ago on the principal of stewardship. Following stewardship enabled the parish to grow, even while planning to build and consecrate a new church. This parish sets 10% of what is pledged by its members aside to help those in need within and outside of the parish. It was able to practice stewardship as a parish, even in the course of building a new church.

It is with great conviction and joy that I urge you to go forward with faith towards adopting and practicing stewardship, for I know that this is the right time to do so in the life of the parish.

As a parish, you will personally experience the power of the Lord in providing for all the existing needs of the parish and enabling you to expand your charitable ministries and works.

As individuals, you will experience joy in arriving at how much you will give based on a serious and prayerful review of your life circumstances and reflection on the gifts He has given you in life. As a parish and as individuals you will feel His love and the love of each other in ways you could not have imagined beforehand. Your nets will be full!
